

An Intruder's Guide to East Arnhem Land by Andrew McMillan won the Territory Read NT Book of the Year. Outgoing Arts Minister Marion Scrymgour performed the honours of announcing the winner in front of a packed room. Andrew won \$5000 courtesy of the Chief Minister, as well as a range of promotional/employment opportunities that Andrew will enjoy throughout the year. In addition to this, Andrew and his publisher, Niblock Publishing, will derive benefits in the form of increased book sales, as will the other NT authors who were short listed in this inaugural award.



Greetings from Sandra

Hi Members.

Welcome back to a year of writing. I hope you're all doing well.

It's hard to believe I've only been back at the desk for the last three weeks. During that time, we've had: the announcement of the Territory Read winner followed by an extensive promotional campaign; a day of planning with the Committee of Management; the annual audit; the engagement of new staff members; and now, I'm just back from Sydney where I participated in a meeting with the Australia Council and other writers' centres and organisations from across Australia. All this while, we have been organising the Eye of the Storm, the Alice Springs Writers' Festival, and the annual

program for 2009 that kicks off with the NT Literary Awards Sophie Cunningham tour (see next page for details).



We introduced you to a few new staff members late last year. In case you missed that news, we still have Michael Giacometti (Alice Springs Project Officer), Leisa Baldwin (Bookkeeper, Darwin) and myself (EO, Darwin) in our previous positions. Dael Allison has left for NSW (as mentioned last year) and has had to be replaced by not one, but two people who are Andy Ewing (Publicist) and Natalie Sprite (memberships & Darwin program). Natálie used to live in Darwin in the earlymid 1990s when she was much loved as a performance poet. She has since moved on to prose, travelled the world and become a mother before returning to Darwin and this office. Your membership enquiries are in capable and caring hands. Finally, we are in the process of engaging an Indigenous Project Officer who will commence work in March. This officer will mostly be working on our national, Indigenous youth project that we manage in collaboration with the Fred Hollows Foundation.

The Territory Read announcement on February 4 was a moment of great pride as we applauded the work of seven fine Territory authors, all vying for the NT Book of the Year award, generously supported by the Chief Minister and ArtsNT. The short listed writers, as profiled in Write Turn last year, were Alec Kruger & Gerard Waterford, Leonie Norrington, Jo Dutton, Nick Bland, Barry Jonsberg and Andrew McMillan who received the Territory Read Book of the Year award, 2009, for *An Intruder's Guide to East Arnhem Land*. Apart from the \$5,000 cash prize, Andrew will enjoy a plethora of promotional benefits, including NT and national media coverage and participation in major, national literary festivals. You can catch Andrew at the *Eye of the Storm* writers' festival, Alice Springs, May 1 - 4.

This year is shaping up to be a big year of Territory books with a number of new titles due to hit the shelves. James Murray's *My Life in the Sea of Cars* is due for an April release and Marie Munkara's *Every Secret Thing* will be launched later in the year. Meanwhile, we have already received advance copies of Nicolas Rothwell's *The Red Highway* and Jennifer Mills' *The Diamond Anchor*. The Anchor will enjoy a launch at the *Eye of the Storm* festival that is rapidly becoming more of a hurricane than a storm (see inside for details). The festival will also see launches of Ali Cobby Eckermann's debut poetry collection, Ptilotus Press's new anthology of Centralian writing and the inaugural anthology of NT Indigenous writing (published by IAD Press and developed in association with the NT Writers' Centre). And these are just the books! Our fine NT writers continue to produce quality screenplays, theatre scripts, song lyrics and more, some of which we will be enjoying over 2009.

With all of this literary activity going on, the NT Writers' Centre is on the lookout for new members of its Committee of Management, famously known as 'the sexiest committee in the NT'. The Annual General Meeting will be held on Thursday, March 26 in the Frog Hollow Conference Room, starting at 7 pm. If you are a member of the NT Writers' Centre and would like to be nominated for a position on the committee, you can pick up a nomination form from the Darwin office or download it from our website: www.ntwriters.com.au. Of course, NTWC members who don't wish to be on the committee are warmly invited to the AGM, as well. Take the opportunity to swan about with your fellow writers, absorb yourself in our annual reports and drink away your membership fees on this once-in-a-year get-together of the NT literati.

While the workshops will provide opportunities for instruction, examples and exercises, the masterclasses will be focussed upon participants' existing drafts. The masterclasses and workshops will be extremely useful if you are thinking of submitting work in either the *Arafura Short Story Award* or the *CDU BookShop Travel Short Story Award*. However, if you're not intending to compete, you are still most welcome at the classes and will no doubt be inspired to enter the awards in another year.

2009 - A Year of Play with Peter Matheson

In 2009, the NT Writers' Centre kicks up its heels for a Year of Play. This year will see a focus upon writing for the stage, with an ArtsNT-funded initiative that will develop, promote and employ playwrights (as well as other theatre practitioners). The Years of the Novel (2006), the Screenplay (2007) and Life Writing Genres (2008) - affectionately known as YONI, YOTS and WALY - saw NT writers develop manuscripts within those genres. However, these were mostly workshop-based courses. The Year of Play, by comparison, will see most of the playwrights' development occurring within the context of mentorships, although workshops/masterclasses will occur, as well.

The Year of Play will be staged in Darwin and Alice Springs. In Alice Springs, the NT Writers' Centre will be partnered by Red Dust Theatre as they prepare for their season of Bite-Sized Theatre. Within this collaboration, playwrights will develop works that will go on to be produced by Red Dust in August. Meanwhile in Darwin, the NT Writers' Centre will be collaborating with Darwin Festival upon readings of developed scripts.

The Year will commence with intensive masterclasses taught by Peter Matheson, by the end of which, participants will emerge with rough drafts of short plays. The best of these scripts will then be selected for further development, with the relevant playwrights enjoying the guidance of Australia's best-loved dramaturg, Peter Matheson. Finally, the selected plays will be read/performed in both Alice Springs and Darwin as part of Bite-Sized Theatre and the Darwin Festival.

The initial schedule for the Year of Play is as follows:

Sunday 22 March - Darwin Class 1, 10-5

Wednesday 25 March - Darwin Class 2, 5:30-8:30


Wednesday 1 April - Alice Springs Class 1, 5:30-8:30

Saturday 4 April - Alice Springs Class 2, 10-5

After the masterclasses, the participants will submit their drafts for consideration for ongoing development and reading/production. Playwrights who go on to this second stage will be paid a commission for their work.

Over the last five years, Peter Matheson has worked dramaturgically with Brink Productions (for STC of SA), Darwin Theatre Company, Kite Theatre Company, Kooemba Jdarra Indigenous Theatre, Jute (2006 Enter Stage Write Program), La Boite, Legs on the Wall (for the 2004 Sydney Festival), Northern Rivers Writers Centre, PlayLab, QPAC (for the 2004 Out of the Box Festival), QTC (with their Emerging Writers Program and with the Queensland Premier's Drama awards), Red Dust Theatre in Alice Springs and Street Theatre in Canberra as well as the Residency Program at the 2003, 2004, 2005 and 2006 Australian National Playwrights Conference and has taught playwrighting at the ANPC for the five years previous.

In 2007, he travelled under the auspices of the Australia Council to Alice Springs, Cairns, Darwin and Hobart and developed the scripts of 41 regional writers; as well as being involved in the Young and Emerging Playwright Program with Jute Theatre. He was a keynote speaker at the 2006 Jute Playwrights' Conference in Cairns, and an international guest at the 2003 and 2006 Aotearoa Playwrights Conferences in New Zealand and the 2005 Banff Playrites Colony in Canada.

2009 Prime Minister's Literary Awards Closing 20 March

The Prime Minister's Literary Awards celebrate the contribution of Australian literature to the nation's cultural and intellectual life. The awards, held annually, recognise literature's importance to our national identity, community and economy. A tax free prize of \$100,000 is awarded to the works judged to be of the highest literary merit in each of two categories: fiction and non-fiction. Authors, publishers and literary agents are eligible to enter books written by living Australian citizens and permanent residents. Books must be first published in the English language and first offered for general sale between 1 January 2008 and 31 December 2008.

Beatrice Davis Editorial Fellowship 2009/10 Closing 27 March

The Fellowship is awarded biennially and offers the recipient an attachment to the editorial department of a US publishing house or houses and a literary agency for up to 12 weeks. The Fellowship has among its aims to offer recipients an opportunity to further develop specific editorial skills of benefit to themselves as well as to Australian publishing; to familiarise Australian editors with US editorial and publishing practices leading to a greater understanding of US markets for Australian books; and to recognise and reward editors for their contribution to Australian writing and publishing. The Fellowship will be awarded in May 2009 and travel must be completed within 12 months of receipt. The recipient will be an energetic and self-motivated individual, able to act as an ambassador for Australian publishing and editing. 



QUARTERLY ESSAY – NOW OR NEVER A SUSTAINABLE FUTURE FOR AUSTRALIA? Tim Flannery

If you are overwhelmed by the science and confusion of climate change, Tim Flannery's Quarterly Essay pulls together and then unravels a gamut of complex ideas in a highly readable text. Grounded in ethics and written with a palpable reverence for the earth, he shows you the causes and scope of the crisis we face — in its fully alarming enormity — and then paints us a glorious salvation.

So, if you can visualise the future in both directions and think that green hills spinning with wind turbines is a bit nicer than pestilence, panic and mass evacuation, then this is the book for you.

Unlike the 'Weathermakers', 'Now or Never' runs to a mere 25,000 words, and may take you a couple of hours to read – which I think could be the most important two hours of reading you ever do. Also unlike the 'Weathermakers', this essay motivates action – because it shows you how it can be done.

In terms of solutions, Flannery unpacks carbon capture, pyrolysis, geothermal power and Denmark's astounding innovations in using the 'wasted night winds' to power their transport. He explains holistic management, a sulphuric stratosphere and the truths and myths of clean coal. And he does it clearly. In one section, Flannery shows how we might restore the world's tropical forests via direct carbon trading with the impoverished people of the equatorial belt. He likens this trading to e-Bay and he makes it sound do-able. Following fast-tracked e-education in the relevant countries; ordinary Australians, like you and I, could 'directly invest in the people' who would maintain the tropical forests of the world – instead of, dare I say, sitting with a crisp white while waiting for the last tree to fall.

When I finished reading the Flannery essay I carried it everywhere like a talisman. I told my son: 'I want to put this in every letterbox in the country – everyone must read it.' He told me to send it to Kevin Rudd – with a request to post it out. So I wrote to Mr Rudd, and sent copies for Christmas, and now I am writing to you.

When you read the Flannery essay you might, as I did, find yourself asking, 'How can I help? What can I do?' I quite fancy being part of the restoration of forests through direct carbon trade or even helping to write that fast tracked e-resource. What finer investment than a life-changing read and some shares in breathable air?'

THE TIPPING POINT

Malcolm Gladwell

With Flannery's ideas bubbling in my mind like a futuristic sulphurous sea (you'll have to read the essay to get this), I visited Absolutely to treat myself to some summer solstice reading. And with goosebumps, came upon 'The Tipping Point'. For here before me was a method for my madness. If the ice caps melt while we're doing 'business as usual', then it's unmitigated climate change – and we all know what Professor Garnaut thinks about that. If our government has its hands tied by big corporations (think Gunns) then it's up to us, as voters, constituents and consumers to shake up some serious action.

And the way ahead may lie partly in this quirky off-beat analysis about 'starting a social epidemic'. Gladwell explains his theories of how ideas 'tip' through three powerful types of people that he calls Connectors, Mavens and Salesmen – and in doing so, shows the amazing transformations of the New York crime scene (where murders and violent crimes were halved in five years), the growth of Hush Puppy shoes (which tipped from \$30,000 pa to a multi-billion dollar explosion following a couple of Manhattan hipsters) and the spread of syphilis in the States. There are examples galore. And though it is light and breezy, the central premises are convincing and exciting. Even Clinton found it quotable. I couldn't put it down.

Amongst other things, Gladwell reminds us that social change follows a pattern:

Innovators -start a new trend

Early Adopters -see something worthwhile and take it on -may 'adapt' to make it more accessible to the mainstream **Early Majority** - tip public opinion

Late Majority - realise that public opinion has tipped **Laggards** - this 10% of the population are slow to follow or hold onto outdated beliefs.

What I realised is that in the past, people have followed this process in working out that the earth is round and that smoking is not great for your health, whereas right now, we're going through this with global warming.

So after reading this book, my question to the world is – where do you sit?
