It's festival time once again. This time, we're in Alice Springs where fine literature rises from the red dust. There's a great hum of excitement around this festival, and I hope to catch you all there as you enjoy the likes of Kate Grenville, Shane Maloney, Yvette Holt, Jennifer Byrne, the wonderful Romaine Moreton (a recent addition to the swelling line-up) and Arnold Zable, as well as local greats Steve Gumerungi Hodder, Michael Watts, Jen Mills, Kenny Laughton, Ali Cobby Eckermann, Jo Dutton and many more.

March came and went too quickly, as did the wonderful Sophie Cunningham who did the Stuart Highway long-haul from Darwin

to Alice Springs. Sophie's workshops and events were enjoyed by all, some of whom have gone on to be published in *Meanjin* (edited by Sophie). This was a great opportunity for Sophie to meet some of our NT talent. Sophie was particularly wowed by the (mostly) new writers of the Barkly who just keep growing in number and output (you can catch some of these Barkly gems at Eye of the Storm).

The AGM also came and went, and a new Committee of Management is now in place, comprised mostly of 2008 members, and - luckily - still headed by the very super Megan Nevett. I'd like to thank ongoing and new members for their commitment, and outgoing members for all they contributed in 2008.

Meanwhile, the Indigenous anthology project clicked into production phase with a final list of 31 works (out of a total 110) being selected. 24 NT Indigenous writers are represented in this inaugural anthology that is being published by IAD Press. Interestingly, a third of the selected writers hail from the Barkly region.

Another ongoing initiative is the See my World project (a collaboration with the Fred Hollows Foundation). See my World 2009 is being managed by Ali Cobby-Eckermann who will be mostly based in the Darwin office when she is not on the road, facilitating writing workshops for Indigenous youth in remote parts of Australia (see inside for more). The NT Writers' Centre would like to thank Deb Dank for her great work on this project last year, and for her continuing involvement from the Fred Hollows side of the desk.

Post-Eye of the Storm, the literary activity will keep on coming with workshops to be delivered by Harry Laing, Rhonda Whitton, Jan Cornall and Linda Jaivin, with play readings at the Darwin and Bite-Sized Theatre festivals, with the popular Meet the Publisher initiative, and more.

That's all for now. Hope to see Darwin people at the forthcoming Shane Maloney events, and everyone in Mparntwe/Alice Springs for Eye of the Storm.

Off the Page - April 26th at new venue, Bogarts

Feature artist for April's *Off the Page* is the brilliant, seedy and very funny, **Shane Maloney**. Maloney is the creator of Australia's most successful crime novel series - the Murray Whelan novels: *Stiff, The Brush-Off, Nice Try, The Big Ask, Something Fishy* and *Sucked In*.

Described by the Courier Mail as "one of the funniest writers in the land", Maloney has won the Ned Kelly Prize for Crime Fiction and been shortlisted for the Premier's Literary Award. In 2004, Stiff and The Brush-Off were adapted for the screen by John Clarke and made into movies with David Wenham in the role of Murray Whelan. Rolling Stone described Maloney's books as "funny and gripping," and Ian Rankin of The Age said, "There's no doubting the brilliance of the writing."

Marie Munkara is the winner of the 2008 Uniapon Award. Marie was awarded the prestigious prize for her darkly funny and beautiful book, *Every Secret Thing*. A warm and engaging performer, Marie will be premiering new work at *Off the Page*.

Also appearing on the night will be writer, director and performer **Alex Ben Mayor.** His first professional work, *Darwin's Dangerous Idea*, was staged in 2001 at La MaMa to great acclaim. Since then, Alex has performed in works for the Carnivale Festival (Sydney), the Darwin Festival, the Melbourne Fringe, and the Melbourne International Arts Festival. As part of *Off the Page*, Alex will be a performing a short scene from the upcoming production, *Origins*.

Providing music for the night is the inimitable **Tracy Bunn**. As one half of the provocatively named Toe Sucking Cowgirls, Tracey released three independent recordings that received nominations in various music awards, including Tamworth's "Golden Guitar Awards". Now working as a solo artist, Tracey's music is characterized by warm vocals and gutsy performances. "... a fine writer, observer and teller of tales. Whether as one half of the Toe Sucking Cowgirls or a solo performer, she is a lady who demands we listen and then delivers." [Michael Mee, Mayerick Magazine, UK] Tracey's influences include KD Lang, Lucinda Williams, Neil Young and Paul Kelly.

The night will be MC'd by the fabulous drag queen **Foxxy Empire** who lists her hobbies as men, politics, stilettos, being chased by paparazzi, food, pleasure, crocodile-egg-collecting, clay pigeon protection squad, dancing and collecting DNA.



Shane Maloney workshop 'Cooking Up a Plot'

This full-day, intensive workshop will begin with a discussion of common writing problems and how to overcome them, based on Shane's own experience. The group will then work with Shane to devise a setting and cast of characters for a classic murder mystery. The participants will then devise a storyline utilising these 'ingredients'. Along the way, the class will discuss characterisation, motive, dialogue, narrative voice and other essentials that can be applied to the participants' own writing projects. The workshop will conclude with a small writing exercise.

If the attendances at Sophie Cunningham's workshops and *Off The Page* (with Sophie and Jennifer Mills) were anything to go by, then attendance at the festival will be big – even with a number of other events occurring in Alice at the same time. Sophie, the editor of one of Australia's premier literary journals, *Meanjin*, is always on the lookout

for emerging talent. She was very impressed by the quality of writing and writers in Alice Springs. At least one work of Centralian short fiction will appear in *Meanjin* this year as a result.

Several book launches by local writers will feature in the festival: Fishtails in the dust – writing from the Centre, Ptilotus Press's follow-up to the highly successful The milk in the sky (May 1); Ali Cobby Eckermann's debut poetry release little bit long time and Kimberley Mann's Awake During Anaesthetic (May 2); and Jennifer Mills' debut novel, The Diamond Anchor (May 4).

Thanks to the 40% of members who responded to the e-questionnaire I sent out recently. Your input is vital in programming workshops, events and services that cater specifically to your needs. Some of your ideas will come to fruition during the festival; others I will work into programming for the second half of 2009, and for 2010.

To stage the festival in Alice, we still need more volunteers to drive people around, stage manage events, run the information tent, and much, much more. If you can spare some time over the long weekend and are willing to help, please contact me.

Leading up to the festival, the Alice office will be open everyday. Pop in to purchase your festival tickets.

Mary Anne Butler had two short plays produced on the national circuit as part of the international Short & Sweet competition. `Drive' was performed in Melbourne in December, and '...I Am...' hit the boards in Sydney in January where it received the judges' second for the week. Mary Anne's full-length play Half Way There will premiere in Cairns in August this year, before coming across to the Darwin Festival and then touring to Alice Springs and Townsville. A co-production between Knock-em-Down Theatre, JUTE, Darwin Theatre Company and Darwin Festival, Half Way There is a black comedy set in regional Australia. It deals with themes of love, loss and development. It was funded for both development and production by the Australia Council for the Arts and Arts NT.

Following on from the success of winning the *NT Book of the Year Award*, **Andrew McMillan** has been invited to the Sydney Writers' Festival, Melbourne Writers' Festival, Brisbane Writers' Festival, Ubud Writers' & Readers' Festival, as well as our own *Eye of The Storm*, Alice Springs Writers' Festival.

Michael Giacommetti's essay 'Kwatye' was highly commended in the Wildcare Tasmania Nature Writing Prize 2009, co-judged by former NT Writers' Centre office manager and 2007 winner Dael Allison.


Ali Cobby Eckermann is invited to the Sydney Writers' Festival, The Dreaming Festival and Overload Writers' Festival this year.

Nick Bland's *A Monster Wrote Me a Letter* was an Australian Honour Book translated into French, Bulgarian & Korean. *I Lost My Kisses* was picked up in the US and won an honorable mention in a US book prize and is still selling well in the States. *Aussie Jingle Bells* has sold over 100,000 copies in Australia. *The Very Cranky Bear* has been picked up in the US on standing orders (a minimum 100,000 print run) and continues to sell well in Canada. Hodder UK have also picked it up and will publish it this year - a notoriously hard market to break into. Nick's latest book, *The Wrong Book*, has just been released.

Rohan Wightman's short story Terra Nullius won 1st prize in the Phoenix Park Neighbourhood House short story contest.

See My World-with Ali Cobby Eckermann



SEE WORLD

It is exciting to be working on this project as Manager in 2009. I was involved last year as an author/mentor, travelling with Deb Dank to Wilcannia where we quickly found 3 eager young writers of poetry and song, to attend the national workshop in Adelaide later in the year. It was such an inspiring time for me. So I am very happy to be on board, and to continue the great work that Deb initiated in 2008.

See My World is a great writing project shared between the Fred Hollows Foundation and the NT Writers Centre. Six workshops will be held in remote and isolated areas, aimed at nurturing young Indigenous writers between the age of 15-25. Established Aboriginal writers will attend the workshops, to act as role models and to share their skills and stories. An anthology of these written works will be published down the track, to be distributed back to those involved and their communities. From what I read last year this book will prove to be quite a read!

Being back in the Territory, and in particular Darwin, has flooded my brain with many memories. I flew to Darwin from Katherine in an air-ambulance after a bad motorbike accident at Edith Falls and spent the next 12 months in a wheelchair. It is wonderful to see old friends again who helped me through those times. Following that I got married, bought 5 acres at Humpty Doo and got divorced. No regrets – poetry and writing is a much more challenging companion.

Working with the NTWC team at Frogs Hollow has been a joy. I have always prayed for an office filled with laughter. Believe me, sitting at the computer listening to Sandra T and Andy E makes one laugh. And the food is always good around here too.

The first workshop will be held at Yuendumu 27-30 April, thanks to the support of Artback, Northern Territory Arts Touring. The workshop will be delivered by Romaine Moreton, Yvette Holt and myself, backing up to the *Eye of the Storm* festival in Alice Springs. Catch me for a chat or stay tuned to *Write Turn*. There will be plenty of great stories that evolve from the *See My World* project.



Non-Fiction Review Shifting ground: art in public places in Alice Springs

The title of Shifting ground: art in public places in Alice Springs is a little misleading. The book is not a showcase of the public art on display around Alice Springs, but a document of Shifting Ground, a site-specific program of art held in Alice Springs over 21 days in May 2007.

The event grew from a concept that was incubated during an *Art~Land~Culture* think-tank in March that year, whereby 'confrontational art', performance art that confronts and challenges the viewer, would be used to explore people's identity and cultural connection to place. The resulting program of art, *Shifting Ground*, involved 58 local, interstate and international artists; over one dozen venues, including many unexpected public places; and about 30 performances, exhibits and interactive installations.

The key aims of the innovative art project were to invigorate debate about how our public spaces are perceived, designed and used; to link people with place using art and stories; to express a yearning to connect with the physical environment and a sub-conscious yearning for a social and cultural link to the arid landscape of Central Australia. In all, it aimed to define a spiritual link with country-not with glorified perches for pigeons to shit on, but with public art as an interactive and evolving social dialogue.

The book's curators have lovingly produced a document of the ground-breaking event. The three essays by Kieran Finnane give greater context to the program of art. The first reports on the inspiration; the second gives a snapshot of the social environment of the time, immediately prior to the Intervention; the third is a review of the event. The poems by local poets are poignant, giving an insight into a foreign world, where 'rain comes ... like an act of redemption' (Carmel Williams, 'The Quickening'), domestic violence is common, and 'the whole country is VB Can Country' (Jennifer Mills, 'this amber land').

The photographs try to capture the fluidity of the event. None does so better than Mike Gillam's cover image. To the untrained eye, it appears like a typical arid landscape of spinifex and mulga in orange sand country. But it describes 'shifting ground in action': a landscape transformed by recent fire, burning the spinifex down into horseshoe-shapes and ironwood to wisps of white ash, but already responding with patches of grasses popping up.

In a 'whitefella' way, the book continues the debate of *Shifting Ground*, of questioning and defining a connection to place, and the nature of belonging to place. Through the publication of the book, a fluid moment has been concreted in time, like a fossil imprint, or the ripples of tide forever trapped in the sandstone of the surrounding ranges.
