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

#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

It is an honour and privilege to serve as President of the NT Writers' Centre in 2024. It is my first year in this role, though I previously held the position of Secretary of the Board. I am otherwise involved with the NTWC mainly as an active participant of its many excellent workshops and programmes throughout the year. The annual program delivered a range of writing development opportunities, retreats and awards to continue to develop and celebrate the diverse literary culture of the NT. This year, NTWC held the fantastic NT Writers Festival on Larrakia Country in Darwin, which included an impressive lineup of Australian authors, including 58% from the local area. Darwin did not disappoint and there were many gorgeous, waterfront sunsets on site at the festival as we moved into each evening's events. Thanks to our members and supporters who participated in the festival and the range of other events the NTWC has put on this year. We farewelled Rita Horanyi and welcomed Louise Omer as Festival

Director and I am excited to see what Louise has in store for us at the 2025 NT Writers Festival to be held in Mparntwe / Alice Springs. Huge thanks go to the Executive Director of the NTWC, SezzaJai Sykes, for all their work this year in managing the NTWC. SezzaJai is taking a well-earned sabbatical this summer and we hope it will be a time to recharge and refresh. This opportunity has been part of the Social Impact Leadership Australia program, as NTWC works to increase its social impact and the difference we make to writers and our community. Thanks to my fellow board members, who generously give their time to provide governance for the organisation.

And last, but possibly most importantly, thank you to all our funding organisations, particularly the NT Government and Creative Australia. Without the support of our funders, the NTWC could not provide the services to writers that it does.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT

The NT Writers' Centre incurred a deficit of \$47,103 compared to a deficit of \$17,426 in 2023.

Total income increased from \$535,157 to \$619,767, the major components being:

- Grants \$462,973 (2023, \$386,094
- Festival and workshops ticketing \$65,535 (2023, \$67,557)
- Members' subscriptions \$9,139 (2023, \$10,417)
- Interest \$5,031 (2023, \$3,831)
- Sponsorship and other income \$390,013 (2023, \$313,155)

Grants, as a percentage of total income, was consistent at 75% in 2024 and 72% in 2023, while sponsorship and other income increased from 59% to 63%.

Expenses also increased, from \$552,583 to \$666,870, again, the major components being:

- Wages, salaries and on-costs
  \$325,094 (2023, \$300,658) a 9%
  increase
- Auspice fee outlays \$23,950 (2023 \$1,713 – the increased outlays covered by increased receipts)
- Rent and outgoings \$48,318 (2023, \$41,358)
- Travelling expenses \$42,328 (2023, \$29,190)
- Prizes \$36,000 (2023, \$1,145)
- Insurances \$6,877 (2023, \$6,530)

- Contractors and consultants \$82,415 (2023, \$66,327)
- Advertising and marketing \$26,833 (2023, \$28,416)
- Hire of equipment and facilities \$27,384 (2023, \$23,504)
- Other expenses \$47,671 (2023, \$53,742)

The balance sheet is showing net assets of \$176,682, with a cash surplus of \$171,347. This amount represents 25.6% of annual operating costs and compares favourably with the funding agencies' benchmark of 20%. The corresponding figures for 2023 were \$223,785, \$216,606 and 39%.

While we are in a sound (and solvent) financial position we need to be mindful of the effect of continuing deficits on our balance sheet, particularly given the current and expected economic climate, and the expectation of continuing cost increases, pressures on government funding, and the constraints placed on consumer spending.

#### EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

2024 has been a solid year, with the NT Writers' Centre delivering a program of writers' workshops, an incredible Festival, supporting authors with publishing their works, and recognising aspiring authors through the NT Literary Awards and published authors at the Chief Minister's NT Book Awards, as well as the Andrew McMillan Trust retreat. 2024 also completed our four year funding cycle from Creative Australia and Arts NT. We have been successful in securing further funding from Creative Australia for 25-28, and from Arts NT for 25-29. This will enable us to continue to meet our operational costs, meet CPI increases in wages, and ensure our core programs are funded. We will have the stable resources to apply for project grants for the Festival, and seek further diversification of income through philanthropic sources.

The 2024 NT Writers Festival was held in Darwin with the theme Reverberations. The festival was curated by Dr Rita Horanyi, and brought together high calibre interstate authors, including Debra Dank, Charlotte Wood and Julie Janson. These highly prized authors were on panels alongside 58 Darwin locals. This year Melanie Mununggurr, Djapu poet and spoken word performer, was the First Nations Guest Curator who developed three highly successful events. Dr Rita Horanyi left NTWC after 5 years of dedicated work and consistent excellence in threading award-winning authors into deep themes that engage, move and connect audiences. Rita had also significantly grown the festival, increasing box office by over 60% and audience participation by 20%.

We had changes in staffing in the Program Officer roles. We have delivered on our key program throughout the year, however, some community projects have not expanded as we seek to re-fill these roles.

Funding scenes are changing, and arts organisations across the country are having to continually repeat how important the arts are, and that our programs can demonstrate significant outcomes in our social impact. In response to leading NTWC into this space, I was successful in being accepted into the 2024 cohort of the Social Impact Leadership Australia (SILA) training. This aims to support our organisation to continue to fulfill its purpose in being a community for writers. This course includes training for the Board and a sabbatical for my learning. This is an incredible opportunity for NTWC as a leading arts organisation in the NT, to continue to advocate for the importance of the art of writing and how we contribute to social well being across the Territory.

I'd like to thank the volunteer Board, for their time, support and championing of the organisation. And finally, to our members, who form our community of writers and storytellers - we will continue to provide opportunities to develop and celebrate the diverse literary culture of the NT. Keep writing!

#### WRITERS' PROGRAM

Each year the NTWC delivers and supports a variety of writing workshops, literary industry workshops, and performance events.

These workshops use NT talent and authors to deliver genre specific workshops, or provide structured writing time for writers to develop their skills and abilities. It can take a long time to go from a concept to a published book (anything from 5 to 15 years!) and the NTWC is here to support the community of writers through their process.

We ran a selection of workshops with great authors and enticing titles including; Generative Writing with Kuya James, Writing for Podcasts with Kylie Stevenson, Unravel with Emma Trenorden, In Conversation with Alley Pascoe, Queer Writes with Clare B, Recording Oral Histories with Charlie Ward & Ben Ross, Writing Identity and Difference with Jeanine Leane, Elevate Your Work with Dave Clark, Introduction to Playwriting with Mary Anne Butler, and Tim Winton in conversation with Laura Lewis.

#### PROJECTS

As part of the organisation's objectives of supporting and showcasing writers, and fostering appreciation of reading, writing and storytelling, the NT Writers Centre produced a range of special projects across 2023.

#### SUPPORT AND ADVICE SERVICES

The NTWC gives advice about writing, publishing, workshops, mentors and editors to members of the public, and our membership. In 2024, we supported 33 writers with individualised support, directing them to additional services they can access and providing encouragement on their literary efforts.

#### ANDREW MCMILLAN WRITERS RESIDENCY

Andrew McMillan (Strict Rules; Catalina Dreaming; An Intruder's Guide to Arnhem Land), was a founder of the NT Writers' Program which later went on to become the NT Writers' Centre. When Andrew passed away in 2012, he left a bequest to NTWC, "for the purpose of establishing an annual writers' retreat for the benefit of emerging writers across genres."

Since 2016 the retreat has been offered each year in his memory. Usually held in the unique outback town of Larrimah, the retreat is open to an emerging NT writer who is working on a substantial writing project in any genre.

The 2024 recipient was Renee McBryde, chosen for the 'great promise of the story to come, with wonderful writing and excellent writing samples'.

### WRITE HERE ,WRITE NOW'

We offered 9 days of uninterrupted desk space at the Mparntwe office to a local emerging writer. Elaine Peckham, one of the Apmereke- artweye of Mparntwe, wanted to develop her book "My Story, My Life, My Journey" about her experiences of growing up in Mparntwe, seeing changes across the town, and being a caretaker of this place.

#### EMERGING WRITERS GROUPS / FEEDBACK GROUPS

In Mparntwe an Emerging Writers group formed with about 20 participants, with a regular fortnightly attendance of 5 people and met over 18 times. This group is run by member volunteers, who offer the group writing prompts, exercises and sharing opportunities. They had a three day residential writing retreat to accelerate anything they may be working on, that attracted 4 people flying in to join this super concentrated writing experience. In Garramilla, a monthly feedback group has been established and facilitated by author and editor Dina Davis. This group has also gone on to form Sunday Review sessions, using the template designed by Dina, to allow members to present and then get feedback on their work from their supportive group of co-writers.



#### **ARTS NT VARUNA FELLOWSHIP**

Arts NT again offered a series of six virtual and three in-person fellowships in partnership with Varuna National Writers House. The NTWC partners on this initiative to assist in the assessment process as well as by facilitating, three 'discussion group' sessions via Zoom as part of the virtual fellowships. The application process was competitive and the successful applicants, each very deserving of the opportunity.

There were 27 applicants, and there were two NTWC members who were successful in their applications; Glen Hunting and Sally Bothroyd.

#### **TRIVIA NIGHT**

NTWC hosted the Book Club Trivia Night at the Darwin Trailer Boat Club. This was a fun event that tested our local, national and international knowledge of authors and books. We had 88 participants, a raffle, an excellent host/dj and raised a significant amount of money.

#### WILD WORDS

Wild Words still went strong through 2024, with an open mic night on the last Sunday of the month and offered writers in Darwin the chance to perform spoken word, poetry and prose in front of a supportive audience. Changes to venues have meant this has moved around a bit, but seems to have found its home again at Flora's Temper cafe. This artist-run initiative, led primarily by Shaun Green, is boosted by NTWC through promotional support.

#### **IMPRINT MAGAZINE**

Imprint was not produced this year due to budget and staffing constraints.

#### **GENEROUS DONATIONS**

We received one generous donation this year, from members of our community that value the work NTWC does. This helped us run Kim's Cubby children's space at the Festival.

### NT LITERARY AWARDS | LIBRARY & ARCHIVES NT

The NT Literary Awards is an important prize for unpublished, short form writing by NT authors. It provides recognition and encouragement to emerging or early career writers to keep developing their craft. 218 entries were received across 7 categories. The NTWC continued its sponsorship arrangement with Library & Archives NT, sourcing judges for all categories of the NT Literary Awards, providing prizes to winners, in particular the NT Writers' Centre Poetry Award, and promoting the competition to our membership. Other NTLA sponsors include Brown's Mart, CDU, Kath Manzie and Zip Print. Winners received \$1000 prize money and a years' free NTWC membership. The winners and finalists works were published in the NT Literary Awards 2024 publication, produced by LANT.

#### YOUNG TERRITORY AUTHOR AWARDS | CITY OF DARWIN LIBRARIES

Each year, these awards support and recognise the NT's newest upcoming writers. To encourage entries into the Yong Territory Literary Awards, in collaboration with the regional Libraries, we ran a series of youth workshops with local authors; Nhulunbuy with Sienna Stubbs, Katherine with Mandy Tootell, Alice Springs with Stick Mob, and Palmerston with Sean Guy. We received 150 entries from 173 participants.



### **NT Writers Festival** 27-30 June 2024 Darwin

reverberations

24NTWF returned to the MAGNT, on Larrika Land in Darwin, and explored the theme *reverberations* from 27 May - 1 June 2024.

Its theme asked us to consider the impacts of our actions, to reflect upon their ongoing consequences. This required us to see the world and ourselves relationally, to look beyond ourselves to the vast and interconnected networks in which we are embedded. Being attuned to reverberations helps us hear the echoes of the past in the present and to reflect upon the ramifications of our decisions.





Christopher has been twice shortlisted for the Northern Territory Chief Minister's Book of the Year award. He was the 2021 UTS Copyright Agency New Writer's Fellow, and his memoir was Highly Commended in the National Biography Award 2021.
